Final Review

I was pleased with my final review. The panel broadly expressed support and enthusiasm for my project moving forward, and commended my effort and organization. I would like to touch on some of the points of our conversation.

Regarding my production book and its elements, the panel agreed that my work was thorough and well organized. The samples that I provided seemed well received, and my production schedule was considered appropriate.

My proof of concept material was garnered praise for effort, quality, and development since midterm. My animatic this time provided a much clearer picture of the entire story. One panelist commented that I could perhaps lengthen the short, and noted that it moved at an entertaining pace. My screen test and train test were successful in convincing the panel of my understanding of technical challenges and their solutions. My style frames successfully communicated my attention to color, as noted by one of the group. If there was anything they wished was included, it was a style frame illustrating a further exploration of the "magical effect", although they seemed satisfied with the style frames I did provide.

While the panel didn't offer much criticism, they did make plenty of recommendations. One panelist suggested an opening shot indicating Christmas. Perhaps I can work that in with the opening title. Another suggestion was to consider matte control and color when choosing props, which I thought was an idea to be explored. They all agreed that the sooner I could begin production, the better. They recommended some further light testing to ensure proper shadowing for the color grade.

Overall, I am heartened at the reception my project received. Sometimes one loses the objective eye when approaching a project so closely. It is nice to hear compliments. I realize, however, that I'm only a third of the way towards my goal, and much hard work lies ahead. I intend to begin planning my production immediately. I'm cognizant of the need for an emotional connection for this story to work. I have to look for ways to bring an audience along in a personal way. As I invest more time and effort, I grow increasingly fearful that I'll somehow miss the mark...but I guess that's the name of the game.


